### JASPER PEAK CONQUERED BY ALPINE CLUB

Party Makes First Ascent of Anchorite Mountain, Eremite Valley

ALPINE CLUB, EREMITE VALLEY, Jasper National Park, July 21 (Special)—Led by Captian E. R. Gibson, of Edmonton, a party on Friday accomplished a first ascent, when Anchorite Peak, overlooking the club's camp, was scaled, included in the party were H. France. London, England; R. Zillmar, Milwauker; Miss. P. Prescot, Cleveland, and R. J. Cuthbertson, Shapnavon, Sask.

A traverse of Alcome mountain was made by Christian Hasler, Lake Louise, with Miss L. Gest, Marion, Pa. Frank McCulloch, and A. Kramer, both of Chicago.

#### Climbs Mt. Edith Cavell

JABPER Aug. 15—Miss Lillian Gest, of Metion, Pa. who has been climbing peaks in and around Jasper and Mt. Robson for the past month, has returned to Jasper with her Swiss guide. Chris Hasier of Lake Louise, with another peak added to the already long list. This time it was the beautiful Mt. Edith. Cavell which lifts its snowcapped peak over 11,000 feet into the siles.

The ascent was the first such successful one of this season and weather conditions were ideal with the exception of a heavy cloud bank encountered on the peak.

# Robson Defeats Alpine Climbers

American Mountaineers Fail in Attempt at Mighty Peak

(Special to The Jeurnal)

JASPER, Aug. 16.— The mighty

Mt. Robson still defies the mountaineer and the highest of all Canadian peaks still remains unconquered this year.

Dr. Strumia of Philadelphia and Dr. Hainsworth of New York returned after nearly three weeks of fruitless endeavor. These two wellknown Alphilats have an imposing list of first ascents to their credit and have elimbed in the Canadian Rockies almost yearly since 1924.

Rockies almost yearly since 1924.
On August 10 they established high camp on the "wishbone arete" of Robson and thoroughly explored the route which they found impossible. Heavy snow up to their shoulders and constant avalanches stopped their ascent of the east face. "A careful survey of the entire base was made. Mt. Robsom has turned them all back this year.

Dr. Strumis and Dr. Hainsworth made several other climbs and first scents. Dr. Strumis made a first climb of Mt. Kain, over 9,000 feet, a needle-shape peak near Red Pass and with Dr. Thorington of Philadelphia made another first ascent of an unclimbed peak near Mt. Kain. The party climbed an interesting peak of over 10,000 feet mear Rearquard for which they propose the name of Mt. Waffi in memory of the man who lost his life in an ascent of Robson in 1930.

# SUCCESS AT LAST

Miss Kate Gardiner Climbs Tasman

### SUCCEEDS AT NINTH ATTEMPT

Advice was received in Cartisteburch this morning that Miss Kate Gardiner, the well-knows English mountaineer, made the ascent of Mount Tasman last Wednesday,

Upon her first visit to New Zealand in 1927 Miss Gardiner resolved to climb Mounis Cook Settou and Tasman. A year later she returned and climbed Mount Cook and upon her next visit in 1931 she succeeded in reaching the summit of Setton. In 1979 and 1921 Miss Gardiner made serveral attempts on Mount Tasman without success and last season the attack was renowed, but had weather drove the party off the mountain more than once. NEW JERSEY TELEPHONE SUMMIT 6-1896 Last summer Miss Hinman's combination of a pack trip in Jasper Park, followed by a five hundred mile canoe trip in northern British Columbia proved so successful and enjoyable that she is planning a similar combination for this summer. This season's pack trip will cover different territory and between it and the canoe trip will be a week at Curlie Phillips' comfortable camp on the shores of Maligne Lake, south of Jasper, for fishing, hiking and boating. The trip will be continuous from the start at the little station of Devona on July 2nd to the end of the canoe trip at Edmonton on September 14th, but Miss Hinman has arranged to touch the railroad on July 23rd, August 12th and August 21st to allow members of the party to leave and others to join, thus making possible a vacation of three weeks, four weeks, seven weeks or ten weeks, exclusive of the trip out and back.

The first three weeks will cover beautiful country in northern Jasper Park and a bit beyond its border and will cross several passes where distant mountain scenery will vie in beauty with nearby meadows of delicate and vividly colored mountain flowers. A day will be spent at the foot of majestic Mt. Robson with its vast icefields, and then a spectacular ride thru the Valley of a Thousand Falls will take the party on July 23rd to the Canadian National Railway at Robson Station where one may leave for or arrive from the East. The party will retrace their steps to Robson Pass and for another three weeks ride and camp in beautiful high country, each day different, and eventually reach Jasper on August 12th. Here those who must, may leave for the East and others will arrive. On these pack trips days in camp alternate with days of travel when approximately fifteen miles is covered in five hours. Camp is broken at about ten, a halt made at noon for a fire, hot tea and a picnic lunch and camp pitched some three hours later. Corrals are made, riding and pack saddles, bridles and halters stacked and covered, sleeping tents and a cook tent, with a stove, erected and a snug, homelike camp is soon ready in the wilderness. Bert Wilkins, an experienced guide and woodsman, will again be in charge of the outfit, assisted by his efficient corps of men who do the work of the camp and spare no effort in making the campers comfortable and happy.

Those who stay on will spend the night of August 12th at the luxurious Jasper Park Lodge and the next morning, each with one small duffel bag, will go by motor to Medicine Lake, cross it in a launch, have lunch at chalets at the further end and in the afternoon ride on a winding, woodsy trail to camp on the shores of Maligne Lake. Here for one week they will fish and take easy hikes to timberline for extensive views, beautiful wild flowers and almost certain glimpses of moose and deer, mountain sheep and goats, and explore by canoe and motor boat the eighteen mile long lake amid snow capped mountains.

On August 20th the party will return to Jasper Lodge for the night and on the 21st those who must, may leave for the East while the others board the train of the party arriving from the East and with them travel westward past Robson station to Prince George where the night is spent at a comfortable hotel in a breezy frontier town of the northwest. On August 22nd they will motor thirty-five miles to Summit Lake, on the divide between Arctic and Pacific waters, where outboard motor canoes will be waiting, and then for three weeks will glide down the little rivers of the north to the majestic Peace. The whole route is full of interest and variety with its Hudson Bay trading posts, Indian villages, gold prospectors' camps, fur traders' cabins and trout fishing everywhere. Experienced boatmen will be in charge and will prepare tasty lunches in sunny spots on shore at noon and set up camp each night in groves of cottonwood or spruce. There will be lay-over days for fishing and seeing the country for the Peace cuts thru the Rocky Mountains and the scenery is magnificent. In late August and September the poplars and ferns and brush along the river banks will be scarlet and gold with approaching autumn. On September 14th the canoe trip will end at Edmonton where the party will entrain for the East.

For many years Miss Hinman has organized and led pack trips, hunting trips and canoe trips in the Canadian Rockies and travel trips "off the beaten track" in Europe, Asia, Africa, Mexico and Central America. She loves to travel and is glad to furnish references from those who have traveled with her and requires the same from prospective campers unknown to her. Whenever possible she likes to have personal interviews in Summit or New York.

#### CAROLINE HINMAN

For the summer of 1937 Miss Hinman offers two unique and delightful out-of-door trips among the mountains and rivers of northwestern Canada - the first a five weeks pack trip thru the Canadian Rockies of Jasper and Mount Robson Parks to the Pass overlooking Mt. Sir Alexander, the last high mountain of the main range of the Rockies, and back by different trails culminating in the spectacular scenery of Robson Pass at the foot of majestic Mt. Robson highest of all the peaks of the Canadian Rockies. Then a day's travel thru the beautiful Valley of a Thousand Falls to Robson station where the trip will end on August 7th and where those who must leave will take the east bound train.

Those who can spare three more weeks will board the west bound train, joining the party who have come out from the East for the second trip. They will leave the train at Prince George, motor to Summit Lake on the divide between Pacific and Arctic waters and for three weeks travel by motor cance down the little rivers of the north to the majestic Peace, making a portage around the canyon where the Peace cuts thru the Rockies and flows eastward from British Columbia into Alberta - a trip full of variety and interest - Hudson Bay trading posts, Indian villages, gold prospectors' camps, rangers' cabins, fur traders in 40 foot freight cances and streams and lakes full of trout. The trip will end at the town of Peace River on August 27th and the train taken to Edmonton and the East.

On the pack trip approximately nineteen different camps will be made and sixteen lay-over days planned for hiking, fishing, climbing and being lazy in camp. Each person has a saddle horse assigned for the entire trip and camp equipment is carried on pack horses. With guides, wranglers and a cook added to the party, the outfit riding single file thru the forest is a picturesque sight. Donald Phillips of Jasper Park will outfit both trips and several of the men in charge have been with Miss Hinman on previous camping trips. These men are experienced on river and trail and will do all the work of the camp on both trips. An hour's stop for lunch is made in some beautiful spot and camp is pitched about three in the afternoon.

The pack trip will start from Devona, Alberta an hour east of Jasper on the Canadian National Railway on July 3rd and will end at Robson station on August 7th. The price is \$425 exclusive of the train trip out and back. The canoe trip will start at Prince George station, B. C., eleven hours west of Jasper on the Canadian National Railway on August 7th and end at Edmonton on August 28th. The price is \$330 exclusive of the train trip out and back. The price for the two trips combined is \$750 from July 3rd at Devona station to August 28th at Edmonton station.

The best route west for both trips is via Toronto and the Canadian National Railway straight to Devona or Prince George. Miss Hinman will be glad to arrange at cost for transportation and Pullman space and if desired will provide a chaperone for each trip out and back. A good train leaves New York Wednesday morning, June 30th, arrives Toronto the same evening, leaves two hours later and reaches Devona about noon on July 3rd. The same trains may be taken for the August trip, leaving New York on the morning of August 4th, picking up Miss Hinman at Robson station on the afternoon of August 7th and reaching Prince George that evening.

Miss Hinman has been over the ground covered on both trips and the memory of weeks spent on river and pack trail amid snow clad mountains, rushing rivers, deep spruce forests, sky blue lakes, alplands above timberline, and beauty everywhere, lingers and will linger until it is all experienced again. Miss Hinman has been for many years the organizer and leader of pack trips in the Canadian Rockies and travel trips "off the beaten track" in Europe, Asia, Africa, Mexico and Central America. She is glad to furnish references and requires the same from prospective campers unknown to her and whenever possible likes to have personal interviews in Summit or New York.

Herewith are your pix. They were most helpful in nailing down your tower, and consequently in determining precisely which other towers were climbed by others. Yours which I have numbered ..l. is a view almost South and shows the Waterfowl Lakes to the left of the minor point in the middle. Incidentally that minor summit is precisely spottable on the #s 2 & 3 are overlapping shots looking pretty much west with the Kaufmann Peaks at the extreme right and Chephren just going out of the left of #2.... #4 shows a subsidiary of your tower which lies just to the WNW of your high point, but we spotted the direction from the braids in the background which shows the Howse River quite clearly and the N Saskatchewan at the extreme | ight. #5 is looking almost north along the lineof the massif. I am somewhat of the opinion that the high point just left of center remains unclimbed. The peak at the left is the summit reached by Stutfield et al, and shows their route quite well.

I've go-ten a couple of more conciliatory letters from the old Goat (JMT) But I had the exquisite pleasure of finding him to have been totally inconsistent and wrong on one point whereinat he had tried to reprimand me. However, I bit my tongue.

There are still a lot of routes and peaks unclimbed in those mtns. I can use a good cook next summer.
