This title has been conferred twice on the Royal Family of the British Empire. Few of ordinary life have received the Feathers. Perhaps. half a dozen are alive today who are white Chiefs of the Stony Tribe.

This evening such a degree will be given to one of the oldest "Indian men" in the West. A man who has associated with the Stonies since childhood, always helped fight for their rights, was one of the originators of Banff Indian Days - his name is James L.

This is a ceremony well worth witnessing.

WHY INDIAN DAYS ARE POSSIBLE

The Bauff Indian Days are made possible by the generous donations from the Banff Springs Hotel, the merchants of Banff and private citizens who donate and give their time without charge. Every dollar subscribed or taken in at the gates the Indians get, either in prizes, rations (food) or payment for their work. No whites take part.

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THURSDAY MORNING

First Day - Tribal Parade

Starting at 10 o'clock, the Entire Stony Tribe Will Parade

Leaving the Indian Village at race track, headed by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the parade will travel along Banff Avenue to the interaction of Muskrat, along Muskrat, passing the X.W.C.A. to Moose Street, down Moose Street to Banff Avenue, thence along Banff Avenue, crossing the bridge and on to the Banff Springs Hotel. En route through the village of Banff the parade will halt on the bridge, where judging of Indian costumes will take place. Here is where the visitors may photograph their souvenirs of Banff Indian Days. Prizes will be awarded to the best dressed Indian man, woman and child, also for the attire most closely depicting the early Indian before the arrival of the horse. Presentation of prizes will be made in front of the Banff Springs Hotel.

Concerts each evening, excepting Sunday, at the Banif Springs athletic grounds, in which Indians only take part. The program will consist of native dancing and prehistoric songs rendered by voices that know only Natura's harmonies. See program on back pages.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON

2 o'Clock at Race Track

- 1-MILE RACE-Three Monies.
- 2-NORDEGG 1-MILE DASH-Kootenay Plain Indians only.
- 3-HALF-MILE SLOW RACE—Riders ride other man's horse. Last horse in wins.
- 4—RELAY RACE—Three monies. Each rider has two horses. At the word go he runs 100 yards, saddles one horse, races around track, unsaddles, and saddles second horse, and races once more around track. First in wins.
- 5—DEMOCRAT AND PIE RACE—Three monies. Driver and assistant eat pie, then harness team of homes to wagon and race around track. First in wins.
- 6-TRAVOY RACE-Half-a-mile.
- 7-INDIAN BRAVES AND COWBOYS MILE RACE.
- 8-BANFF CHAMPIONSHIP BRONG RIDING CONTEST WITH SADDLE— Regulation Stampede riding rules to apply. Rides scoring highest marking on the day's ride to receive respectively, 1st, 2nd and 3rd day
- 9—BANFF CHAMPIONSHIP BAREBACK BRONG RIDING CONTEST—Regulation Stampede riding rules to apply. Riders secting highest markings on day's ride receive respectively, 1st, 2nd and 2nd day money.

FRIDAY and SATURDAY, July 19-20

Second and Third Days - Chiefs' Parade

At 10 a.m. the Chiefs' Parade, with Royal Canadian Mounted Police escert, will follow the same route as the Tribal Parade of Thursday, going as far as the Banff Springs Hotel. The parade will halt on the Banff bridge, where judging will take place of the best Indian man's, best Indian woman's and best Indian child's costumes.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON

2 o'Clock at Race Track

- 1-HALF-MILE DASH-Twice around the track. Three monies.
- 2—CIGAR RACE—Three monies. Each rider supplied with cigar and matches, runs 100 yards, saddles horse, once around track. First horse in with cigar smeking wins.
- 3-ONE-MILE DASH-Three monies.
- 4—RELAY RACE—Three monies. Each rider has two horses. At word go, be runs 100 yards, asddles one horse, races around the track, unsaddles and saddles second horse, and races around track. First hores in wins.
- 5—HALF-MILE SLOW RACE—Three monies. Riders ride the other man's horse. Last horse in wins.
- 6-COWBOY RACE-Three monies. Spectators move to centre field.
- 7—FINALS OF CHAMPIONSHIP BUCKING WITH SADDLE—Regulation Stampede rules to apply. Biders scoring the highest markings on day's ride receive respectively, 1st. 2nd. 3rd.

Title and final cash purses in this event awarded to the three men respectively having the highest total markings on two horses they have ridden on Thursday and Friday, and Banff Championship Title.

8—BANFF CHAMPIONSHIP BAREBACK BRONG RIDING CONTEST—Regulation Stampede riding rules to apply. Biders scoring highest markings on day's ride receive respectively. 1st, 2nd, 2rd.

Title and final cash purses in this event awarded to the three men respectively having the highest total markings on two becase they have ridden thursday and Friday, and Banff Champlenship Title.

For over 50 years the Stony Indians from the Morley Reserve have come to Banff for their annual celebration. The mountains were the hunting grounds of this tribe up to the time the white man came pushing through his ribbons of steel to the Pacific. From that time onward the Stonys, bowing to the inevitable, have remained in the foothills. As the time draws near for the annual trek to Banff the old as well as the younger members are in a state of suppressed excitement, for in these valleys their forefathers lived and many memories remain.

The evening programs are most interesting. Native dancing dating back to hundreds of years ago, secompanied by tom-tom drums and the singers. The War Dance, the Chicken Dance, the Deer Dance, the Arrow Dance and many others.

Nowhere else in the whole of America's Indian tribes have the old songs and dances been so well preserved, weird and wonderful songs and acting, dating back for hundreds of years. The music taken from the sounds of battles and war, or the most welrd and gentle harmony of the wind, the noise of water falling, the storms over the mountains, the echoes of the canyons and cliffs, or the still music of the night, and so it goes—something to be seen and never forgotten.
