THE DAY'S NEWS

CARES are this day being cast aside by a group of persons assembled from Africa, America, Asia, Europe and Oceania aboard this palatial and spacious steamship. It is the privilege of a Canadian organization, so closely identified with the successful development of a young and ambitious dominion, to be host for a period of four months to a distinguished gathering from older countries, on whose foundations history has erected such fine structures.

During the next 127 days, for 1932 is a Leap Year, many lands will be visited and the relics of ancient civilizations examined, but the present interpretations and appreciation of the past depend to a large extent on a knowledge of current happenings throughout the world. An effort will be made, therefore, in this daily news sheet, to chronicle those events of general interest to its readers, and so enable everyone to maintain close contact by wireless with the major activities of their fellows ashore.

Despatches will be received from various sources, some being broadcast by American, British or Canadian radio stations and others by different agencies around the globe. This paper is dependent entirely on the shore selection of news items, and may on certain occasions be confined by atmospheric conditions to one country. A just distribution of the space available will be given to American, British, Canadian and other world events, where this is possible and desirable within the dictates of conservative newspaper practice.

BIG BANK MERGER

MANUFACTURERS AND CHATHAM PHOENIX PLAN UNION

NEW YORK, Dec. 3. — Plans for a merger of the Chatham Phoenix National Bank and Trust Company and the Manufacturers Trust Company into an institution with financial resources of over \$550,000,000 and deposits in excess of \$400,000,000 were approved by the directors of both. The two banks, which will have a new name to be announced later, will be under the chairmanship and presidency of H. D. Gibson, president of the Manufacturers. L. Kaufman, chairman of the Chatham Phoenix, will be chairman of the executive of the merged banks, and H. Von Elm, vice-chairman of the Manufacturers, will be vice-chairman of the board. The merger is subject to the approval of stockholders, and by state and national banking authorities.

Under the terms of the merger, the Manufacturers will issue 546,750 new shares of its \$25 par stock, to be exchanged for 810,000 shares of \$20 par value stock of the Chatham Phoenix, which is in the ratio of about one share of Manufacturers for each 1½ shares of Chatham Phoenix. It is not expected that the necessary legal steps will be completed before next February, and the merger cannot be consummated until early in 1932. In the meantime, both institutions will pay their regular dividends for the fourth quarter.

During the absence of cruise members excursion will recall of fresh features of their stay on the Isla of Madeira, made more pleasant by a beneficent sun. While friends in Canada, Great Britain and the northern section of the United States were experiencing early winter temperatures, that of New York having descended to three degrees above freezing on Tuesday, compared with 67 degrees aboard the ship at noon yesterday, cruise members obtained their first sight of those beautiful flowers that contribute so materially to the attraction of the lands and towns they visit. Further comment on the Island is unnecessary, as everyone will have formed their own opinions and gained enviable impressions during the short day.

This may possibly be the last season on which cruise passengers will visit Terreiro da Lucta chalet by railway, as it is understood automobile service is in contemplation. The roadway, which is excellent, passes through delightful groves of pine woods, followed by eucalyptus, while many attractive houses and gardens may be seen on either side. Considerable time, too, is saved in mounting to the summit. The highway continues upward another 1,500 feet to the Poiso, which in Portuguese means "pass", and onwards to the site of a projected golf course. The turf is admirable, and very similar to that of Scotland. The sole handicap is the mist, which hangs over the locality for six days in seven during winter months.

## LENZ AND JACOBY LEAD

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—S. Lenz and O. Jacoby led by 1715 points over Mr. and Mrs. Ely Culbertson in the first round of the great American contract bridge tournament. The battle will last six weeks, and 150 rubbers will be played. Excitement engendered by so much publicity had an unfavorable effect on the match, only three rubbers being completed. Many mistakes were caused by nervousness. The object is to test the relative merits of approach—the forcing system sponsored by Mr. Culbertson or the one, two, three system backed by Mr. Lenz. The former wagered \$5,000 against that advocated by Mr. Lenz.


## RUBBER RESTRICTIONS


"The Cradle of Civilization"...



THE MEDITERRANEAN, *Sea Between The Lands*, has a length of 2320 miles and a maximum breadth of 1080 miles. The greatest depth is 14,400 feet.

The Adriatic, Aegean, Balearic, Ionian, Levantine and Tyrrhenian Seas are divisions of the Mediterranean. Chief tributary rivers are the Ebro, Nile, Po and Rhone. Largest islands are the Balearic group, Corsica, Crete, Cyprus, Sardinia and Sicily.

The Mediterranean Sea is practically tideless and is saltier than the Atlantic Ocean. Its surface evaporation causes a rapid inflow of water through the Straits of Gibraltar. Scientists believe that Europe and Africa were joined, ages ago, at this point. There is also belief that the Mediterranean was formerly divided into two parts by land extending between Italy and Sicily and from Sicily to Tunis.

#### PRINCE TALKS ON TRAVEL

##### H.R.H. EMPHASIZES NEED FOR EXTENDED TRAVEL

LONDON, Dec. 16.—Speaking at a meeting of the Travel Association, the Prince of Wales said too little was known of Britain's charm, while too much was heard of financial and industrial difficulties, which he regretted Great Britain shared with the whole world. He emphasized the need for extended travel. If the British people were being dissuaded temporarily from travelling abroad for pleasure, as apart from business, foreign countries would realize this was merely an emergency measure. As soon as the situation became more stabilized, the British people would certainly go abroad again, just as the Travel Association hoped people in countries overseas would visit Britain.

"Travel and trade are international, and it is only by exchanging goods, services and visits that we can live in comfort, peace and mutual understanding," he said. "If we always stay at home and try to eke out a livelihood by taking in each others' washing, it will be a precarious livelihood for the whole world."

#### MONTREAL MONEY MARKET

MONTREAL, Dec. 17.—The establishment of a foreign exchange market in Montreal is believed to be part of a plan formulated by Prime Minister Bennett for stabilizing the Canadian dollar.

It is understood that the Montreal money market, when established, will regulate the exchange between Canada and Great Britain direct, instead of through New York.

#### U.S. TRADE DECLINE

##### EXPORTS DOWN OVER BILLION DOLLARS FOR 11 MONTHS

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—Concurrently with the fierce attack on President Hoover's proposals for a moratorium on war debts, amounting to an investigation of his actions, the American trade figures for eleven months were published. They disclose an enormous decline, although there still remains an export surplus of sixty millions sterling at par (\$291,600,000). The year's outward trade shrank by 256 millions sterling (\$1,244,000,000) compared with 1930, while November's exports alone decreased 19 millions sterling (\$92,000,000).

In a dramatic moratorium debate in the United States House of Representatives, Mr. Hoover was accused by a Republican of violating his oath and bleeding the country "white" for the sake of Germany. This charge was met by a direct challenge from another Republican, who said: "Prove it or go from here as a foul traducer of the character of an honest man."

#### NO PAY FOR EMPLOYEES

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 16.—Twenty-six thousand city employees received notices that there was no money in the treasury, and that all the city tax receipts were required to meet the interest on \$546,000,000 indebtedness, due in January.

#### BAD FIRE IN SIAM

BANGKOK, Dec. 16.—Five hundred buildings, including the Bank of Canton, in the Chinese business quarter, were destroyed in the worst fire experienced by Siam's capital. Two thousand persons were rendered homeless.



Dominating the city and most impressive in appearance is the famous ACROPOLIS, a limestone plateau on which rest the remains of ancient Greece's greatest structures.

On the Acropolis are the Propylaea, the Temple of The Wingless Victory..... the Erechtheum with its Porch of the Maidens... the Museum .... but outstanding in interest is THE PARTHENON, immortal gem of classic architecture.

The Parthenon was built in the Fifth Century B.C. under the supervision of Pericles and remained in a good state of preservation until 1687 A.D. when it was reduced to ruins by an explosion.

Other places of interest in Athens are the Temple of Jupiter; the Areopagus (Mars Hill) where St. Paul is said to have preached; the Temple of Theseus; the Pnyx; the Hill of the Nymphs; the Theatre of Dionysos and the National Museum.



## MANY BOOKS BURIED

### RIGHT WING OF VATICAN LIBRARY COLLAPSED

ROME, Dec. 22.—Some ten thousand volumes were buried beneath a mass of masonry and other debris, when the entire right wing of the Vatican Library, built in 1588, collapsed this afternoon. Fortunately the larger part of the staff and a number of workmen engaged in repairing the building had departed shortly before the accident. It is still uncertain whether there were any casualties, as it is believed that over a dozen people were in the library at the time.

All available fire brigades of the City of Rome were rushed to the assistance of the Vatican brigade, which was unable to cope with the stupendous task. The disaster involved about one-quarter of the whole library, in which were housed many books of great value, and precious manuscripts that included a letter from Martin Luther to Pope Leo X, written in reply to the latter's warning on his heresies. It is hoped that the majority of the volumes and other literature will be recovered.

## COLD IN LONDON

LONDON, Dec. 22.—The mercury fell to 42 degrees in London and 40 degrees at Kew. Iceland, just outside the Arctic Circle, was ten degrees warmer than London. The metropolis had another sunless day, being the eleventh consecutive dull day. Such a dismal record has not been seen in London for many years. Reports from most sections of the country indicate that the first real Christmas for some years will be experienced.

## MORATORIUM PASSED

### SENATE APPROVES RESOLUTION BY 62-12 VOTES

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—President Hoover's programme for postponement of inter-governmental debts for one year, beginning last July 1, was approved in the Senate by a vote of 69 to 12 after a stinging attack had been made upon it and the President. The resolution as passed carries an amendment that places Congress on record against the revision or cancellation of European debts to the United States. Except for the signature of Mr. Hoover, the resolution is now law.

Although the outcome was never in doubt, as 68 of the senators had pledged themselves to vote for it, a small group of opponents, led by Senator Hiram Johnson, contributed a daring attack on the presidential position. He accused Mr. Hoover of using the Constitution as a mere scrap of paper, which he tore to pieces in negotiating the moratorium agreement without the approval of Congress. Senator Johnson declared the President had failed to tell Congress that his original moratorium had been altered at the insistence of France, forcing Germany to make unconditional payments to the French Government and to borrow funds for this purpose.

## SWANSON FOR GENEVA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22.—Senator C. Swanson, the ranking Democrat in the Foreign Relations Committee, has been offered an appointment as one of the American delegates to the General Disarmament Conference at Geneva next February. It is understood he has accepted.

### SITUATION AT SHANGHAI

#### CITY BLAZING AND THOUSANDS OF CHINESE ARE DEAD

Owing to the great interest being displayed in the Sino-Japanese situation at the present time, an effort has been made to obtain sufficient news by radio to convey a comprehensive idea of conditions at Shanghai and their influence on the actions of other countries. Although the position would appear tense, there is no need for Empress of Britain cruise members to be unduly concerned, as the liner is not scheduled to leave Hong Kong for the troubled area until February 14. Passengers may feel assured that their interests will be given every consideration by the Canadian Pacific Company, and any necessary alteration in the ship's itinerary made if and when advisable. The news hereunder has been relayed from San Francisco.

SHANGHAI, Jan. 30.—According to the latest available information, the Chapei native section of Shanghai is a huge bonfire and the 500,000 inhabitants are seeking cover. Flames were spreading towards the International Settlement as Japanese aircraft continued to rain bombs on the stricken city. The Chinese, reinforced by the crack nationalist troops of Marshal Chiang Kai Shek being rushed from Nanking, the capital, were putting up a fierce resistance and fighting the Japanese land forces to a standstill in many places.

Chinese civilian casualties, in addition to those of the military forces, were reported to be enormous. The Japanese contrived to keep secret the extent of their own dead and

### MACDONALD GIVES VIEWS

#### EVERY EFFORT BEING MADE TO ESTABLISH PEACE.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—The truce arranged at Shanghai last night, as a result of the intervention of the British and United States consuls-general, was fairly well observed. There was a good deal of street fighting, which continued during the morning.

Referring to events in Shanghai, Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald said last night: "For the moment I assign no blame, but I believe I can safely say that every effort is being made by the great governments to establish peace. We have all signed the Kellogg Pact. We all belong to the League of Nations. The essential condition of belonging to the League is surely that we are determined to solve difficulties by negotiation and conciliation, and not by a swift resort to armed force. That is contrary to the spirit of the League and must be made contrary to the practice of the members of the League. Quite apart from the details of diplomacy and methods of handling, I express without reserve the moral and rational regret of everybody that such events should happen, and I appeal to everyone to sheath their swords and allow common sense and reason to square up their difficulties."

### LOAN FOR NEW LINERS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30.—The Shipping Board today loaned \$15,000,000 to the Paul W. Chapman interests in New York for the construction of two new ships, against the advice of President Hoover.

#### WAR MAY END

##### JAPAN INFLUENCED BY WORLD POWER INTERVENTION

TOKIO, Feb. 1.—Unofficial reports indicate that hostilities on the Yangtze River will be drawn to a close shortly as a result of intercession by the principal world powers, though the true reaction of Japan to the steps taken by the British, American and French Governments in their attempt to settle the Sino-Japanese dispute at Shanghai was uncertain tonight.

Following a meeting of the Privy Council to consider the conditions in China, orders were sent to Kure for two battleships, eight destroyers and four torpedo boats to prepare for departure for Shanghai. Two million pounds sterling was voted for a continuation of hostilities in Manchuria.

Four hundred Chinese were killed on Sunday, when 3,000 troops under General Tingchao, commander of the Chinese Eastern Railway guards, launched a bayonet attack against Shuangohen Pu, near Harbin. The guards were driven back after several hours of fighting. The Japanese lost 21 killed and 31 wounded. The Soviet authorities are permitting the Japanese to use the southern extension of the railway, and a Japanese detachment is expected to reach Harbin this morning.

#### NEUTRAL ZONE MOOTED

LONDON, Feb. 1.—The Foreign Office announced today the formal approval by Great Britain of the establishment of a neutral zone around Shanghai, and controlled by neutral troops, as a result of the Sino-Japanese fighting in the International Settlement.

#### BRITISH TARIFF PLAN

##### DOMESTIC TRADE AND UNEMPLOYMENT CONSIDERED

LONDON, Feb. 1.—Discussing the new British tariff policy, Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald expressed appreciation for support received from his colleagues in the cabinet, who had assisted him in attaining a desirable and profitable end. Particular care would be taken not to erect tariff walls in handling the new impost schemes. A tariff agreement was desired, and every effort would be made to induce nations to lower rather than raise walls against one another. While consideration was being given to the maintenance and extension of foreign markets for British goods, it was necessary to keep in mind domestic commercial conditions and the subject of unemployment.

#### HINKLER GETS AWARD

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The Sea-grave Trophy for the most outstanding demonstration of the possibilities of transport by land, air or water in 1931 was awarded yesterday to Bert Hinkler for his solo flight in a light plane from Toronto to London via New York, Jamaica, Brazil and across the South Atlantic to Dakar.

#### NEW FRENCH SUBMARINES

LONDON, Jan. 31.—The submarine armada of France is already the most powerful in the world, but will be reinforced during the current year. Fifteen ships of the largest type are due to be commissioned shortly. During the past seven years, France has laid down 78 submarines, as compared with 26 by Britain in the same period.
