



When the curtain was finally rung down at midnight, last Saturday, upon the week's proceedings, Banff's eighth annual carnival passed into history as the greatest programme of winter sports ever attempted in the west. Hundreds of visitors who arrived daily during the festivities enjoyed every moment of the eight days from the officila opening to the crowning of the carnival queen.

The weather was an important factor, delightful sunshine during the day, clear frosty nights with an occasional flurry of anow to whiten the ground, contributed to the success of the event in no small measure. The weather could be described as Idea' and yet the words would not converto the reader just how pleasantly the weather man behaved.

Events were run off in quick succession and the words "Not a dull minute" might be appropriately arrangealongside the carnival slogan "Let's Go!" without impairing its peppy suggestion the slightset. The businesslike rethods and all-round efficiency of the carnival executive impressed the different competitors who were willing and anxious at all times to give their best and to assist the overworked officials in such a way as to make each competition interesting to the spectators. There were plenty of entries in all events and keen competition did much to keep the interest at fever heat.

While every branch of winter sport was well represented at the carnival, probably no event was found more interesting to onlookers than Canada's own national pastime, a game at which Canadians hold the honors—ice hockey. For sheer thrill, daring, speed and marvelous demonstrations of physical fitness, Banff's Carnival put on a programme of ladies' and men's hockey that would be hard to equal anywhere in the world. Ladies' teamsfrom Calgary, Fernie, Canmore, Vancouver, and Banff, contributed a large share of entertainment, while the men

were represented by one of the speediest collections of hockey stars that ever graced the ice in the Calgary Canadians, who were opposed by the men's senior team from Canmore, a team that would be a credit to any large city and one that was able to take the measure of Calgary in one game.

Calgary Hollies, piloted by Lorne Hannay, who has a habit of producing winning teams, won the Alpine trophy and with it the championship of Western Canada, and as far as the writer is aware may lay claim to Dominion honors. Fernie Swastikas, last year's champions, were favorites and expected to win. They are a fast skating bunch, good stick-handlers, and have a lot of polish around the nets. Their easy victory over the Calgary Pats in the early stages of the tournament made them look like sure winners, but they reckoned without Canmore, a newly organized but exceedingly ambitious lot of players under the tutelage fo Mrs. Wilson. The Minnewankas, as they are called, stepped into the fast Fernie girls and beat them 1-0. Fernie supporters murmured something about over-confidence and other kindred ailments that affected their favorites, but it is the ability to slip the puck past the goal-tender that counts and Canmore won. Even Canmore's rooters were willing to admit that their girls had a little luck attached to the victory, but that doesn't affect the final count at all. The Hollies easily disposed of Vancouver and made a muc heasier disposal of Canmore in what was supposed to have been a two-game series, the score for the first game being 6-1, it looked like too large a handicap for Commore to overcome, so the management decided to withdraw leaving the Hollies winners on a hard-fought field.

Banff Juniors succumbed in their habitual manner to Canmore Junior onslaughts and lost with it any opportunity they might have had to get a well-earned revenge. Canmore has been trimming the local pride with great regularity all winter and it was expected by home supporters that Banff would turn the tables before the carnival crowd. But they didn't, and

that's that.

The midgets also helped Canmore along by lozing a tough battle. These two teams have been fighting neck and neck throughout the season and it was anybody's game. For young kids they displayed a great brand of hockey that kept the crowd on their toes all the time.

Another outstanding event and one that promises to become more important as years roll by was the first annual road race. This was won in spectacular fashion by Harold Pemberton of the Hillhurst Athletic Club. Calgary. He covered the distance of five miles in 30-30, over half the run being against a heavy wind and driving snow and finished with a sprint that showed he had plenty of pep left. Chas. Reid, Banff's only entrant that finished, made a bad showing and disappointed many of his supportersbut Charley ran a hard race the day before to win the three-mile anowshoe even and wasn't in the best of condition. Against a strong field and with such a hot pace set by the leaders he was lucky to finish.

Corp. Wark and Constable Martin cleaned up the men's altijoring and provided the crowd with the usual thrills that accompany such an even Harry Knight, vouthful doe musher

Harry Knight, youthful dog musher, with a string of dogs that had no license to win from Ike Mills, according to the dope handed out by dog men, upset the calculations and predictions of dog race fans by winning the first two heats, in a neck and neck finish that gave the crowd a lot of pleasure. Although Ike won out very easily the third heat, his time wasn't good enough to rob Knight of the Strongheart trophy and the money prizes that accompany it. Jas. Mc-Lean drove his dogs to third money and Smoky Saunders drew fourth.

The crowning of Queen Dahlia Schagel, of Fernie, was a fitting climax to a wonderful week. Miss Schagel is a member of the Fernie Swastikas and a prime favorite with hockey fans in Banff. Although she only won out by a very narrow margin, having been given a warm battle by Miss Sophie Blaskin from Canmore, Fernie deserved the win, as they served notice before arriving in town that they had a candidate for queen whom they intended to elect. Can" Vince Downey, of Calgary, is Banfi's first carnival king. He won this coveted honor after spending most of the afternoon battling various opponents at the "Fun-of-the-Carnival." Josh Henthorn and Freddy Johnston were strong finishers, but Vince was declared elected by the narrow margin of six and seven-eighths. Freddy Johnston was the carnival's most handsome man.


